OVERVIEW

108 players played for the Club this season, compared with 81 last season, and 51 games were played compared with 53 last season. The number of games cancelled, primarily because of the weather, was significantly higher at 12 compared with 3 last season. The Spring tour to Sri Lanka proved enjoyable, although the results were poor and almost none of the players was under forty- a situation reflected throughout the Club during the season. An end of season Easter tour to the Cook Islands produced if anything an older party than toured Sri Lanka, but was just as enjoyable, and with better results. A winter tour of South East Asia has been arranged, together with a more social tour to Cairns during the Sri Lankan Test match in July. The Club has incorporated, and is trying to expand its activities beyond the playing field again, especially in relation to re-establishing a golf section.

City and Suburban

Thirty four people played for the C&S team in sixteen games this season compared with 25 people last season in the same number of games. Regular availability again proved a problem.

The C&S team overall enjoyed a season of good cricket, played in the right spirit and continued the CCNSW winning spirit! Our season culminated with a great BBQ at the Brooks' place which was funded by the players' fines throughout the season; the stats. on the fines were more important than the cricket stats! Thanks also to Ed's little black book.

The Centenary season of the City and Suburban C. A. was originally scheduled for 23 rounds but the first couple of weeks were interrupted by the Rugby World Cup and the competition did not effectively start till October 11. We played 16 games, won 11, lost 3 (including twice to Yaralla), drew 2 and cancelled 5 because of rain. We had a bye in Round 9 on 6 December. The standard of cricket was quite good and our quotient at the end of the season resulted in a very accountable 1.6574, which would be the envy of some Grade and Shire Clubs. We were "smashed" by Colleagues on 29 November when they accumulated 8-238, going down by 192 runs but we had two games when the Club accumulated 220 or more.

Our bowling was the strength of the side with an opening attack of Ed Smith and Benny (“oh c’mon”) Wood, well supported by Greg Brooks, Bruce Grigg and Dennis Cameron.

Greg Brooks had a most encouraging season, scoring 330 runs @ 33 and took 29 wickets @10.45. This would probably qualify him for the All Rounders Award if one were given. Henry Vera came into the side just before the Christmas recess and in 7 innings made 288 runs @ 41.14, including a wonderful 112 against I. Zingari (Australia) at Camperdown. He also had two scores of 50 or more in his short season, and it is understood that he will be with us full time next year.

Whilst Craig Kitson only played in four games this season, he had a magnificent innings in wet and windy conditions down at Dangar Field at Rose Bay on 25 October, when he scored 73* out of a score of 163. It was the best seen from Craig for some time and he had no fears of the bowlers or weather that day.

Captain Steve Taylor had a mixed season with the bat, and miscalculated his score against Sydney Uni Vets to be 99* after a brilliant partnership with Greg Brooks. Steve also had the duty of keeper on some occasions with the absence of a regular keeper. His brother Derek made 206 runs from his 10 appearances, but suffered a broken thumb which put him out for some weeks. Scott Perry only played five games but was still able to score a sound 62 against Beavers, and towards the latter part of the season, we saw the re-emergence of Matt Weise who made 132 runs from just three appearances. Hopefully we will see him regularly next season.

Three century partnerships were recorded. Matt Weise and Henry Vera had a second wicket partnership of 102 v Hunters Hill whom we agreed after some years to play again but at Camperdown; then Paul Brandon and David Bolt had a third wicket unbroken partnership of 122 v Scots Old Boys whilst the best was last, for the fourth wicket when Steve Taylor and Greg Brooks smashed the Sydney Uni. Veterans’ bowling to the tune of 175 in 95 minutes, also at Camperdown on 8 November.

Overall there were ten partnerships of 50 or more runs during the season. The team was blessed with some excellent batting and only on one occasion did we fail to pass 100 runs. It was great to see us get revenge on the Old Aloysians just before Christmas when we dismissed them for 88 and then Old Cranbrookians As at the end of February when we dismissed them for 93.

In the bowling department, Ed Smith and Greg Brooks battled for the top honours, Ed just pipping Greg with 30 wickets to Greg’s 29 but Greg had the last laugh with an average of 10.45 to Ed’s 14.70. Ben Wood took 16 @18.81 and Bruce Grigg 15 at 15.40. Brooksie sent down his usual spate of no-balls with 22 this year but was outclassed by Ben Wood with 23 whilst Grigg “whizzed” down 11 wides, (not including those at the SCG v The Army).

Most catches were by Greg Currie (keeper) with eight from just four appearances, Steve Taylor 7 Paul Brandon 7 and Henry Vera 6.

We lost Paul Brandon from last December until next Christmas, when he moved to Toowoomba to further his studies in surveying and the job of “Aunt Sally” fell on Steve Taylor, Matt Gale and at the end Greg Currie. Matt also got a broken thumb, batting v Canberra Grammar Old Boys, so the 86 byes were shared around.

Our groundsman Jai Lee Soo retired at the end of January at Camperdown and we had a younger man to prepare the wickets. The pitches were well grassed and there were some "whinges" that we were not playing on batsmen's wickets, but it did not prevent good scores being made. Perhaps next season we will see the grass mown a little finer and this should satisfy those complainants! (There were some suggestions that he used to be a bowler!)

Many thanks again to JR for his continual support to the C&S side which always makes the players' job easy, even as he gets crankier!! (Sorry mate!)

Thanks also to Brooksy for chasing players late in the week and for always being available on a Friday night to put the covers down if rain was looming.

With the C&S season completed, John Russell announced his retirement as Scribe of the weekly 'From the Sidelines' which courtesy of Scott Perry has been circulated by E-mail to all Club members on the web. It will be up to someone else to take on this part of the Club's activities next season. [JR/ST]

Masters

Twenty six people played for the Masters in ten games this season compared with eighteen in eleven games last season and we came sixth out of 18 teams, compared with tenth last year our highest placing for some years. While regular availability was a problem at the start of the season, by the end we had a regular team squad.

The Masters' squad continued their nomadic existence, relocating this time to the Hornsby First Grade Shire grounds of Epping Oval and Somerville Oval, Epping. We had hoped to use Camperdown as in 2002-2003, but unfortunately the requested Sunday hiring fee was more than we could afford, being more than double what the C & S side were paying on Saturdays for the same wicket! Epping Oval had no covers, but we fortunately completed our three scheduled matches without a hitch. Somerville had better facilities, including a well appointed canteen and covers, which the incumbent groundsman would normally lay for us the night before (unless there was no game on the Saturday, as we belatedly discovered for our last game which had to be cancelled).

Over the past few seasons we have steadily clawed our way up the competition ladder, wallowing near the bottom for some years at the beginning of the millennium, to equal tenth in 2002-2003, and now sixth in 2003-2004. Our resurgence coincided with the arrival of Craig Somers in December and Jim Hadley in January. We had won one out of four till the end of November and then proceeded to win every game played afterwards! These two gentlemen brought a definite solidarity to our batting: Craig an elegant No 3, and Jim the punishing mid-order pinch hitter. Their season averages of 194 and 73 respectively, certainly reflect their contributions with Craig being dismissed only once and Jim twice! Jim played the most entertaining innings of the season against Barker Old Boys on a sweltering day in February- 43 retired from 14 balls, including 3 dot balls! Probably the most satisfying shot of the season was played by our No 10, Jay Patel who at the beginning of his 24 n.o. against Parramatta heard the cry: "He can't hit the ball !", so promptly carted the bowling over the square leg boundary for 6!

Other willow wielders to shine for us included Simon Nelson who once again topped the aggregate with 201 runs- scored primarily in the first half of the season. John McDonald, Mick McCormick and Greg Currie were again batting mainstays with 160, 149 and 109 runs respectively.. Although lacking consistency, they each played match winning innings on a number of occasions. Brian Breakspear, Sandy Grant, Garry Winney and Richard Morris each played a defining innings among their limited contributions while Robert Lenard (15 year old son of our opening bowler Chris) played some classy cameo knocks for us, usually a a last minute fill in. Sadly, we'll have to wait another 25 years to once again secure his services! Brian Fallon, Ian Neil and Bernard Hill also contributed to the mix and ensured excellent team camaraderie.

Behind the stumps was shared quite capably throughout the season by firstly Martin Dando (who regrettably retired after 3 games), Greg Currie and Sandy Grant, whilst Dean Galvin also satisfactorily filled in on one occasion. Greg took the catch of the season against Warringah- stretching fully to his right and then just balancing the ball in his webbing- to dismiss their gun No 3 bat Rob Easterbrook (sometime occasional tourist at the Gabba for CCNSW). This culminated in our most satisfying win of the season, beating the former Premiers two seasons ago for the first time in Masters' history.

In the bowling department, Jay Patel was again "Mr Reliable", claiming the team bowling aggregate and average with 16 wickets @10.01. I guess it helps to play two games every Saturday so he can "warm up" for us on the Sunday! He could always be relied upon to tie up the batsmen with his accurate slow medium darts. Chris Lenard and Mick McCormick were our regular opening attack, and were generally quite penetrative, claiming nine wickets each. Garry Winney's mixed bag snared him seven wickets@10.14 from only three appearances, which was an excellent contribution. Brian Breakspear and Adrian Hawkes chimed in with their regular consistency to claim 9 wickets between them, and new recruit Jim Hadley managed six wickets with his accurate leggies. Garry Hayres was limited to two appearances by injury, but bowled particularly well to claim 3 wickets- two of which contributed to our first win over Warringah. Simon Nelson and Craig Somers contributed as stop gap bowlers, and occasionally snared partnership breaking wickets.

I strongly believe that if we can retain our current team on a consistent basis for next season, with possibly the addition of another quality quick bowler, we can challenge for the title. Our batting strength is now amongst the strongest in the competition, which is quite a turn around from seasons past.

A big thank you to all of our twenty six players throughout the season who each played the game in the right spirit and ensured that this Masters' side will always be a pleasure to play in. A big thankyou to our eleventh hour fill-ins, Mike Birchall, Robert Lenard, Brendan Scott, Col Erickson and Owen Murray who ensured we always had a full team. [JMcD]

Other games

85 people played for the Club in twenty five social and tour games this season compared with 72 last season, although only a core of 22 played 5 games or more. Significantly more games were cancelled this year than last primarily due to weather.

This year we had the privilege of playing on several major grounds:- The S.C.G. v the Victoria Barracks XI in the celebration, to the day, of 150 years' cricket at the ground; Telstra (Olympic) Stadium v the XXIX Club from Melbourne and Bradman Oval at Bowral v the Bradman Foundation XI. We were also due to play at Alan Border Field in Brisbane v the Q.C.C. but rain interfered. In Sri Lanka we played on international grounds in Colombo, Kandy and Dimbulla.

Match managers were encouraged to start raising their sides early and not rely on E-mail to which few players replied. They were also encouraged if possible to select at least one potential new member who might join the Club. Generally there were few problems of availability with some games such as Bowral and Mudgee oversubscribed. The quality of the sides we played varied but essentially every member of the Club whatever his ability had the opportunity to play and contribute.

Before Christmas we hardly played any social games, primarily because of the weather. Our first game v the Canberra Cavaliers at Mittagong was cancelled by a very localised storm. Then the Wombats proved unwilling to travel from Camperdown to Epping when we had to move the ground location. We finally managed a game in early December v a visiting Dutch side, thanks to our excellent covers at Camperdown. Not bad on the field, they proved formidable drinkers off!

Perhaps disturbingly, we struggled to raise a side to travel to Brisbane to play the QCC and watch the Indian Test match, despite the attraction of playing at Alan Border Oval. We need not have been worried. The game-and half the Test –were rained off!

The weather relented for our game v the Primary Club at their pretty ground at Dooralong. While stronger than last season, the Primary Club were still generally older than our players and the quality of our early batting, strongly based on North Richmond, proved decisive on a bowler friendly wicket.

After Christmas the frequency of games increased. While we had only played twice before Christmas, there were 11 social games in the second half of the season. The weather relented for Lindfield cricket week and despite the reluctance of nearly all our regular Saturday and Sunday players to travel, Garth Jones in his inimitable manner, raised a competitive side, in which Rhys Jones in his only innings of the season, scored 72* with hardly any other player getting double figures. It is sad he does not play more often and a waste of talent.

Largely due to the efforts of our President, John McGruther, we then had the great privilege of in effect representing the civilian population of NSW v the Military in a game at the SCG to commemorate 150 years of cricket at the ground. The SCG treated us superbly, using the full facilities of the scoreboard including slow motion replays, and the game literally went down to the last wicket in the 50th over when the Army won by one wicket, after a magnificent display of hitting when they seemed destined to lose. An 8 hour video is available to anyone interested.

Again largely due to the efforts of our President, we were able to play at Telstra (Olympic) stadium where we won a close fought game v the XXIX Club. The atmosphere was slightly marred by the news of the death of David Hookes that evening and worries about the health of one of our players who had to leave the ground suddenly-worries which happily ultimately proved groundless.

Steve Taylor again organised two sides for our Canberra weekend. We lost an enjoyable and close fought game v Molonglo on the Saturday but were outclassed by a much younger and stronger Canberra Grammar Old Boys side on the Sunday. We will need a stronger side next year to be competitive.

Our regular game v the Bradman Foundation XI was again at Bowral. This year our side was older than usual and despite the forceful stroke play of Bruce Earle, we lost fairly comprehensively. Our game v the Lords Taverners was cancelled by rain, and then at the end of March we played the Kookaburras at Kenmore Mental Hospital, Goulburn in a game meant to mark Garth Jones' official retirement. The lack of interest from any of our regular Saturday players (who had no game that weekend) and also from our regular Sunday players was disappointing but once again Garth assembled a competitive side who thoroughly enjoyed the weekend, kicking off with a magnificent dinner at the old Willowvale Mill on the Saturday night, and ending by winning a close fluctuating game on a magnificent Autumn's day with Owen Murray bowling superbly to pick up the best bowling figures for the Club for some seasons.

The weather held for our traditional Anzac day weekend game v I. Zingari (Australia) at Camden, where we were beaten fairly easily by a younger side with more players with current Grade experience. Finally we went to Mudgee at the beginning of May where we rounded off

the season with a win on a bitterly cold day. This year unfortunately we did not play at the Winery Ground

The season was framed by two tours overseas-to Sri Lanka in September and to the Cook Islands at Easter. In both cases the touring parties were old, and few of our regular C&S or Masters players went. Those who did enjoyed some magnificent hotels, and competitive cricket on Test and International grounds in Sri Lanka and some enjoyable but not too competitive cricket in the Cook Islands. In both cases, many players brought their families. Both tours were thoroughly enjoyed by all who went.

The Club's reputation for touring will continue to be enhanced later this year with an older and family oriented tour to Cairns in July during the Sri Lanka Test match and a younger, more "boys own " tour to Asia in late July. [AMH]
