### **OVERVIEW**

*104 players played for the Club this season, compared with 133 last season. Of these 74 were financial members and 30 were guests or non-financial members. Camperdown was used for our home games both on Saturdays and Sundays, and 24 home fixtures were played (with another 12 home games rained off) during the season compared with 24 last season. Overall 59 games were played compared with 56 last season. 22 Members played ten or more games compared with 15 last season. The number of games cancelled, was 11 compared with 14 last season. A 3 week 8 -game tour to India was arranged in February. While enjoyable and successful in social terms, the team was badly outclassed on the field. We again repeated the tripartite at Caloundra in June 2008 winning both games v the Q.C.C. and the XXIXers. The Ashes tour in July 2009 is proceeding with approximately 65 people going*

*In respect of the golf section, there are now 5 annual fixtures in August 2008 for the Stuart Mathlin Memorial Trophy at Riverside Oaks, Macquarie Links in November 2008, Morisset in January 2009, the Coast in February 2009 and an enjoyable day at Blackheath in May 2009. We are repeating our now traditional end-of-season lunch at the Vacluse yacht club at the end of May. There are also monthly Monday lunches for those that can attend. The Club was also heavily involved in organising a 99.94 Bradman lunch to celebrate the day when Bradman would have been 99.94 yrs old.*

**India Tour Played 8 won 2; lost 6**

15 players ultimately went on the tour and one person guested in one game. The Team had a wonderful tour of the Rajasthan and Mumbai over a three week period. Experiencing hospitality that was almost embarrassing, we were able to frequent a number of local cricket and sports clubs, including the Cricketers Club of India, and playing at a number of Test and few first class venues. Alas, the performance of the side did not always match the quality of the hospitality and the venues. Whilst we had a great line-up on paper (including a Queensland Country representative, Phil Bourke) like most touring teams on the sub-continent, we had difficulty adjusting to the conditions. The local teams played well and were adept at “bullying off the front foot”, whereas as Australians we still preferred to go back and across even if the pitch hasn’t got any bounce. There were 15 tourists (a number of them new to the club and touring) with our tour guide (an accomplished spinner) also getting a game. We played 8 games, winning two in the middle of the tour, somewhat inflating our egos, but losing six. Phil Bourke from the Gold Coast starred with the bat, averaging 82.33 (top score 64) , John Joyce from Lindfield averaging 31 and Paul Brandon averaging 25. The bowling was not as good as the batting, but David Jones got 5 wickets at 17.8 whilst the other bowlers toiled hard for little reward. Highlights of the tour were the Taj Mahal, attending an Indian Wedding, Rajasthan generally, Mumbai and the Cricketers Club where we stayed for a week. The ladies on tour enjoyed the hospitality and the shopping. Generally, the tour exceeded our expectations with little discomfort health or injury-wise. It was a credit to Ajoy Roy, who was involved with the tour from the outset and his local knowledge, experience and good-humour was essential to the great memories we now share.

*17 players turned out for the C&S side this season compared to 23 last season. This was made up of a core of 13 players who played 5 or more games, the same number as last season.*

C.C.N.S.W. had another successful and enjoyable season in 2008/2009. With basically the same squad as last year we continued to enjoy our cricket and most importantly enjoy the game in the right spirit. Led by Steve Taylor we won some close games and lost some games comfortably! The Jack Pace Shield continued to elude us as we went down to Nondescripts in a really close semi final by 7 runs. Unbeaten up to Christmas we lost regular C&S games to Knox OBs and I Zingari (Australia) after the break but then finished the season with some fine wins. Leading the batting was our talented South African Craig Johnson (556 runs including a 107 \*), Steve Taylor (434), Ian Allmey (379) and Darren Kay (377) .Dave Byrnes led the bowlers with 35 wickets closely followed by Ed Smith (29) and Greg Brooks (26).Byrnes however failed to take 5 wickets in an innings (4 wickets 7 times) and was fined accordingly! All players made worthy contributions at some stage during the season and space does not permit mention of any more heroics or indeed fines!

The team only called upon 17 players during the season which was a great credit to the team spirit we have built up over the past few years. The end of season bash at Mooney Mooney on the Hawkesbury was a great finale and the stories told will remain just that!

Once again my thanks to all players for their contribution during the season, to Bronwyn for the amazing afternoon teas which are enjoyed by all clubs who travel to Camperdown Oval and to our wives and girlfriends who I suspect are glad to get rid of us every Saturday afternoon.

**Masters****Played: 11. Won: 7. Lost: 4**

*22 people played for the Masters in 11 games this season compared with 26 last season and a core of 11 players played 5 or more games compared with 13 last season. We came 4th out of 17 teams, winning 7 games and losing 4, an identical position to last season.*

It could be argued that the Masters just treaded water this season as we ended up in exactly the same position of fourth on the table this year. However this was a great effort again considering that there was less of a playing pool and the standard of some of the weaker teams had clearly improved.

We got the full season quota of 11 games with only one being delayed.

We had some excellent wins against Warringah, Kenthurst and Burwood with a couple of close losses and one drubbing against Lane Cove White where the only batting collapse of the season arose. The game against the Sri Lankan Lions was a game we should have won but six catches going down during the final opposition partnership was no recipe for victory.

As is the case every season we rarely had a full strength side as the combination of bad backs, hamstrings, groins, thighs, heads and calf muscles led to constant withdrawals not to mention the dislocated shoulder that Greg Currie incurred diving into a fence.

On the field we had major contributions from all players this year with the runs, wickets and catches being relatively evenly spread. Glenn Rosewall was the leading run scorer in the whole competition scoring 281 runs with Mick McCormick 2<sup>nd</sup> on 271 runs. Craig Somers will be looking to get many more runs next year as he had some rare failures but played some very good innings in between as usual.

Frank Crowe had a mixed season either quacking or getting a 40 with not much in between but still managed to brew a top pot of tea for the teams at Camperdown. Greg Currie was tireless in all his efforts again and it was much appreciated when he played on after he had dislocated his shoulder against Lane Cove; a testament to his toughness and commitment.

Keith Elloy had a great season and took aggressively to the bowling, scored many 40s and was only rarely dismissed. Dale Richards and Angus Martin both played less than one would have hoped but made invaluable contributions when they did. Richard Xuereb (205 runs) played some great knocks and his aggressive and match winning innings against I Zingari (Australia) was a highlight.

The bowling of Richard Xuereb (13 wickets), Jim Robson (16 wickets) Graham Buck (13 wickets) and Phil Schaefer always caused major problems for the batsman and their wicket taking this season reflected that. All bowled many unplayable balls which normally would result in even more scalps.

Jay Patel had a few injuries but bowled well and was inspirational in the field particularly under the high ball. Tim Roslin bowled well and got a great 5 for against Parramatta.

Bruce Earle played just one game against Kenthurst but contributed significantly to our first win against Kenthurst in all aspects batting bowling and fielding. Garry Winney also only played one game getting some runs and hope to see more of him next season as with Inspector Jones, Greg Rogers and Wayde Carter.

Steve Cross helped the team out on at least three occasions when late withdrawals occurred and both his bowling and fielding was appreciated. Thanks also to Matt Gale and Mike Birchall for their late notice call ups.

Thanks to the C & S boys for putting out the covers when the rain threatened.

All in all a satisfying and enjoyable season.

**Mick McCormick Masters Captain****Classics****Played: 8. Won: 2 (one by forfeit). Lost: 6 Drawn: 1**

*24 people played for the Classics in 8 games this inaugural season and a core of 9 players played 5 or more games. We came 4th out of 6 teams, winning 2 games and losing 6 games.*

Last season a few experimental over 50s games were played and I commented then that: "Next year in better weather will be a more accurate test of interest". It appears that people were interested and we never had to struggle to raise a team.

No-one knew whether in fact interest and physical health would be maintained through ten games, and whether the competing demands of Masters and social games would cause difficulties. They did not. While

some of our players in the Club aged over 50 rarely played or indeed declined to play at all, we had sufficient depth to always have a full side. Indeed the ageless Greg Currie and Jay Patel played not only the over 50s but also the over 40s. To help him relax Greg also helped out the youngsters on Saturday in the C&S while Jay played both Saturday mornings and played a pivotal role on Saturday afternoons in guiding Lindfield 4<sup>th</sup> Grade Shires to the Grand Final. In addition Ross Dalgleish and Keith Elloy played regularly for their respective o40s Masters sides on alternative weeks, and their scores might suggest they found the o50s Classics more demanding!

We welcomed as new players Ian Hills, Garry Easey and Paul Georgiadis who played regularly. All were steady and accurate medium paced bowlers with Paul the best batsmen. While our attack was not penetrative, it was steady and made the batsmen work for their runs. Occasionally we were supplemented by the sharper pace of Joe Scarcella and Phil Schaefer struggling through the pain of a wearing hip joint. For slow bowling we had Jay Patel, recovering from a shoulder injury and alas all too rarely Dennis Cameron. Martin Berry with his slow flighted wrist spin – at this level- can always be a formidable, if sometimes expensive- bowler, especially v inexperienced tail enders and was always eager to show what he could do. When fit, both I and Sandy Grant added to the bowling. Sandy at a pinch could always keep as well and bat.

On the batting front we lacked depth. Ross Dalgleish was technically correct and never flustered. Keith Elloy enjoying a golden Renaissance was dominating but several times unlucky to be given out lbw off inside edges. Greg Currie was usually good for a few and kept well but we lacked a forceful and reliable middle order. This in part led to the promotion of Jay Patel. Restricted in opportunities in the Masters by a powerful and talented middle order, he came into his own in the over 50s showing a range of orthodox shots and good concentration. A large number of talented players such as Garry Winney, Joff Johnson, Brian Breakspear, Ken Grose and Ajoy Roy only played once or twice but made us realise what we were missing. Then there were our non complaining ever faithfuls such as Brian Fallon and Mike Birchall, always willing to turn up, always supporting the team and often scoring a few runs to their and their team mates' delight.

The result of this sort of side was that we could normally restrict but rarely bowl out a side. We could always – or nearly always- make a reasonable score but lacked the middle order depth to turn a reasonable score into a winning score. Only once were we badly beaten by the undefeated Premiers, Lindfield Lawyers.

What I can say is that people certainly enjoyed playing and mixing with their old friends and opponents. Now is the autumn of our careers with winter and all Eternity coming up fast. Make the most of what is left to you. It is still worth playing.

#### **Other social games (excluding Indian Tour)**

**Played: 13 Won: 6 Lost: 8 Drawn: 2 Cancelled: 7**

*86 people played for the Club in 21 social games (not including India) this season compared with 115 last season in the same number of games. Excluding the Indian tour, only a core of 5 played 5 social games or more, the same as last year. A large number of members only played one or two social games*

I concluded last season's report by stating: *“Unless more players and especially younger players are willing to play in these games, Sunday and midweek social cricket will fade away.”*

We appear to be holding our ground but not improving. While it did not prove such a struggle to raise a side this season, the average age of the players continued to increase and we had a large number of players only playing one game. We finally managed to raise a significantly younger side for the last game of the season v I Zingari (Australia) only for the game to be rained off. Ian Neil has hopes of persuading some of the younger players to turn out for us next season.

We played at the SCG v the QCC for The Jack Chegwyn Cup with former Test player David Gilbert playing for us, but rain forced a draw when we were in a promising position. With the aid of a couple of guest players we won an extraordinary game v Croydon CC on a misfield off the last ball for the Scott McCallum Cup and lost our game v Lindfield for the John McDonald plate by one run. We retained the Barrackers Cup again for the Army game simply because despite being again scheduled twice, it was rained off twice!

We played the XXIX Club at the Albert ground but this year had an easy win as their side was not as strong as the side we played at the SCG last season.

This season, the ACS (Victoria) travelled to Sydney and we lost a close game. While we could not match their hospitality at Rupertswood, we were able to entertain them to a BBQ before they flew back to Melbourne

As usual despite lack of support from the regular players Ed Smith organised an excellent Canberra weekend with magnificent hospitality but the standard of our players was disturbingly old and poor as we sank to 2 well deserved defeats.

Paul Brandon called on his wide circle of acquaintances supplemented by some of the Indian tourists but this year we slid to a narrow defeat v Old Oxleyans. Craig Johnson turned out a powerful side v Lords Taverners but rain prevented our winning a one sided game by a large margin.

We were again privileged to be invited to play at Bradman Oval where Paul Witherley managed to win an enjoyable and tight game in magnificent autumn weather. Our annual pilgrimage to Mudgee, this year organised by Ross Dalgleish, was well supported, magnificent weather, a great meal afterwards and this time a win on the field. A great way to end the season.

### *Conclusions*

I do not think it is yet the death of social cricket. By way of contrast I am informed the Primary Club have gained over 20 younger players this season and significantly strengthened their sides. There is hope for us yet!
