### **OVERVIEW**

Since the end of last season the Club has played 76 games. Not including the Ashes Tour in July 2009, 109 players played for the Club this season, compared with 104 last season. Of these 72 were financial members and 37 were guests or non-financial members. Camperdown was used for our home games both on Saturdays and Sundays, and 36 home fixtures were arranged during the season compared with 24 last season. Overall 58 games were played in the season compared with 59 last season. 23 Members played ten or more games compared with 22 last season. The number of games cancelled, was 12 compared with 11 last season. A one week 6 -game tour to Tasmania was arranged in January 2010. While enjoyable and successful in social terms, the team was outclassed on the field. We again repeated the tripartite at Caloundra in June 2009 but this time losing both games v the Q.C.C. and the XXIXers.

In respect of the golf section, 5 annual fixtures were arranged: - in August 2009 for the Stuart Mathlin Memorial Trophy at Riverside Oaks, Macquarie Links in November 2009, Morisset in January 2010, the Coast in February 2010 and Blackheath in May 2010. Morisset was cancelled for lack of support and Blackheath poorly supported. We are repeating our traditional end-of-season lunch at the Vaucluse yacht club at the end of May. There are also monthly Monday lunches for those that can attend.

## **City and Suburban**

**Played: 17 Won: 17 (2 by forfeit) Lost: 2 Drawn: 1 Cancelled: 4 (2 by rain)**

*21 players turned out for the C&S side this season compared to 17 last season. This was made up of a core of 14 players who played 5 or more games, compared to 13 last season.*

C.C.N.S.W. had their most successful season in many years during the season. Led by Steve Taylor we finally won the Jack Pace Shield in its fifth year after being semi finalists or finalists in the previous four seasons. Once again we were unbeaten up to Christmas but lost C&S games to Knox Old Boys and Scots Old Boys after the break. I don't know what it is but something happens to us in the month after Christmas.

We then finished the season with some fine wins including the Jack Pace Shield final against Yaralla in March. Leading the batting once again was Craig Johnson (483 runs @ 60.38 including a 99\*). Craig is a most consistent player and we all wish him a speedy recovery from the shoulder surgery in April. The rest of the batting this year was very consistent with no fewer than 6 players scoring 200 runs or more. Scott Wells (298), Ian Allmey (286), Steve Taylor (265), Derek Taylor (252) and Dave Byrnes (202) all contributed at crucial times. The bowling however was dominated by two vastly different approaches. Fast bowler Ed Smith (42 wickets @ 9.9) and slow bowler Dave Byrnes (40 wickets @ 8.17) led the attack proving too straight (Ed) and too wily (Dave) for nearly all opponents. Newcomer Dave Stingl (18 wickets @ 17.39), Greg Brooks (14 wickets @ 9.57) and Scott Wells (10 wickets @ 10.8) provided plenty of support to the star duo. All players made worthy contributions at some stage during the season and space does not permit mention of any more heroics or stuff ups. However we have built up a healthy kitty for the end of season bash.

All the above is a statistical summary. What really counts is that once again we have thoroughly enjoyed our season. The undoubted team spirit we have built up over the past few years no doubt contributed to several close wins and good times both on and off the field. The end of season bash at Mooney Mooney on the Hawkesbury was again enjoyed by all and our thanks to Steve Taylor and Veronica for hosting us once again.

My thanks to all players for their contribution during the season, to my wife Bronwyn for the amazing afternoon teas which are enjoyed by all clubs who travel to Camperdown Oval and to all, I wish you a happy and healthy off season.

## **Masters**

**Played: 10 Won: 6. Lost: 3 Drawn: 2 Abandoned (rain): 1. Cancelled (rain): 5**

*25 people played for the Masters in 10 games this season compared with 22 in 11 games last season and a core of 12 players played 5 or more games compared with 11 last season. We came 8th out of 21 teams, winning 6 games and losing 3, compared to 4<sup>th</sup> out of 17 teams last season when we won 7 and lost 4.*

This was a Kevin Rudd type of season for the Masters.... promised much early but in the end disappointed and failed to deliver. The weather was very unkind with six games from eleven being affected resulting in only 9 ultimately being completed.

The first half of the season however was outstanding, being undefeated in the four games that we did play with some very good batting compilations. The win against Doyalson on a 40°C plus day at the Central Coast was a standout as they are a good side and ended up second on the table and we fielded with only 10. The out of jail fight back against Warringah was also an excellent win. Unfortunately our batting could not continue its good form after Christmas and this led to two collapses and an effort that should have been better against the ultimate winners Parramatta.

On the statistics front it was great to have Craig Somers in excellent form before Christmas scoring 40 in the first four games he topped the aggregates with 184. Paul Allen added the aggression and quick scoring that complimented Craig's game and we got off to many great starts which assisted with our early victories. Glenn Rosewall had some good 40 scores early and accrued 175 runs. Jim Robson was a stalwart in the batting (148 runs), bowling and fielding. Ritchie Xuereb bowled some great spells and ended up topping the wicket count with 14 in spite of having a shoulder injury and missing most of the second half of the season. Joe Scarcella and Dale Richards also had some fine moments during the season with Joe's 4- 11 against Kenthurst in the final game a highlight.

Graham Buck had an outstanding season and just keeps on improving. He has proven an invaluable opener with a miserly run rate. The "Triple J" spinners Jim, Jay and Jack all bowled well and gave the captain plenty of options. I reluctantly point out that Jay Patel opened the batting and carried his bat to victory against Kenthurst.

There did seem to be a distinct reduction in the number of quality catches this season as arthritis usurped suppleness though the outfield catch of Glenn Rosewall against Doyalson was deserving of a KFC bucket.

We had help filling the team at the last minute on numerous occasions and thanks to Steve Cross, Mike Birchall and Brian Fallon in particular. We had a lot of players who made one or two appearances in the disjointed rain affected season and all those efforts are much appreciated. We also hope next season to see more of Angus Martin, who has at least three wedding anniversaries a season, Dale Richards and Garry Winney on the paddock.

Thanks for the v/c Frank Crowe helping out when we struggled to get numbers on the days before the game; thanks also to Greg Currie for his assistance with covers, canteen, kit, coffee and all other assistance that is all much appreciated.

Thanks to Adrian Hawkes for all the work in relation to replacement grounds and statistics and equipment. Special mention to Ian Neil and Steve Taylor for their efforts in securing Camperdown.

#### **Classics**

#### **Played: 9. Won: 1. Lost: 8 Drawn: 1**

*25 people played for the Classics in 9 games this season compared with 24 in 8 games last season. A core of 11 players played 5 or more games compared with 9 last season. We came last out of 6 teams compared with 4<sup>th</sup> last season, winning 1 game and losing 8 games compared last season with winning 2 and losing 6.*

If we can get regular interest from the entire Club's over 50s players we could realistically aim for the Premiership next year.

The only victory C.C.N.S.W. registered was in the penultimate match of the season, when Ajoy Roy came back from his injury a month before the doctor's advice to assist the team taste their first victory against Hornsby. This was one match where we managed to field a reasonably well balanced team and got the desired results.

The close defeats that could well have been won by C.C.N.S.W. this year:

1. In the first match against Hornsby, we bowled tightly to restrict them had the proceedings well under control until the last over we bowled which uncharacteristically cost us 12 runs in the final over and lost out on the last ball of the match.
2. In the second match against Lindfield Larrikins, we had 3 unbeaten batsmen in the bank who were in a great position to chase down the opposition's total of 184 with our scoring rate just above par. But at the death overs we got done by some of the finest bowling spells in any form of cricket from Bridle who ended up with figures of 8-3-13-6.
3. In the third match against Lane Cove, we just had to score 4 runs in the last over to outscore their total of 145 runs and win the match, but Ajoy with his badly

injured right arm [severed biceps] could only use his left arm and managed to score only 1 run off a fantastic 40<sup>th</sup> over from R. Pym. Ajoy got injured at 26, came in to bat a second time and still managed to score 6 additional runs with the use of only the left arm. He had to undergo surgery to re-attach his biceps to his elbow and was off for 3-4 months. Greg Currie then took over the captaincy of the team.

4. In the fourth match against Lindfield Lawyers, we lost the match on the second last ball of the 40<sup>th</sup> over as the opposition just managed to overtake our total of 7 for 113.
5. Ironically, we snatched defeat from the jaws of victory not once, but twice against the Championship winning team Ashfield De La Salle Old Boys. In the first match C.C.N.S.W. scored 8 for 156 and had the opposition in trouble at 7 for 88 in the 28<sup>th</sup> over, but managed to lose from there on. The story got worse in our return encounter where we scored a meagre 9 for 105 after a great knock of 48\* by R. Ludowyke. Our bowlers Paul Georgiadis & Garry Easey gave us a dream start with some very accurate and effective spell of new ball bowling and had the opposition batting in ruins at 6 for 16 at the end of 10 overs. The bowlers were changed and with that so did our fortunes as we got chased down by the last pair of batsmen who put on an unbeaten and ultimately winning partnership of 34 runs.

In many ways the just concluded season illustrated the moral and practical problem of over 50s C.C.N.S.W. cricket which are exacerbated by continually losing. To what extent does the implied obligation to give everyone a fair go override the imperative to win by batting your best batters first and bowling your best bowlers in long spells first? Should you allow your opening batsman also to open the bowling? Should you take good bowlers off after 5-6 overs, rather than 10 overs, to allow perhaps less able bowlers to have a go? When do you bowl your potentially more expensive bowlers- at the death when runs are at a premium or in the first twenty overs when you want to keep the pressure on?

To a large extent the current situation in the over 50s is that we are selecting from 11 available players-whatever their ability and if you are going to persuade them to play the next game you must give them a go.

However, if availability improves, the choice of picking players for next year could be interesting from a potential list of over 27 or more participants eligible to play in the over 50s:

So as far as I am concerned, as the skipper of the team, I acknowledge the immense contribution of the members who regularly made themselves available and bailed us out consistently right through the season. The pre-match & post-match roles played quietly by Adrian Hawkes and Greg Currie involve substantial amount of time & effort and often go unnoticed. On behalf of our team, I gratefully acknowledge, applaud and appreciate their tireless & consistent efforts. On a personal note, I remain grateful to Paul Georgiadis for carting me around for every match that I played and attended as a supporter. I am also very

appreciative of the fact for example that but for Martin Berry I would not have been able to attend the post-match Chinese dinner after our last match of the season. The C.C.N.S.W. Classics team is not an unhappy team and we still enjoy playing but winning more often would make it more enjoyable and improve our morale.

As the previous skipper Adrian Hawkes concluded last year; *“What I can say is that people certainly enjoyed playing and mixing with their old friends and opponents. Now is the autumn of our careers with winter and all Eternity coming up fast. Make the most of what is left to you. It is still worth playing.”*

#### **Other social games including Tasmanian Tour\* (excluding Ashes Tour)**

*88 people played for the Club in 20 social games (not including the Ashes tour) this season compared with 86 last season in 21 games. Including the Tasmanian tour, a core of 13 played 5 social games or more, compared with 5 such persons last year. A large number of members only played one or two social games.*

Any season which contains 3 ties must have its moments of excitement but it would be fair to say that our younger and stronger players played less social games than last season and this is reflected in the results. We did not win a match before Christmas although we managed to win 5 and tie 2 of the 11 games played in the New Year.

We started with our traditional game v the Primary Club at the magnificent Barker College Oval but lacked both the batting and bowling strength to seriously challenge. The Army game was rained off twice and we had to forfeit v a younger Moore Park XI eager to play on turf when we were unable to raise a side on a Saturday. Paul Brandon recruited a fresh group of players to play Old Oxleyans but made the mistake of lending them our best (and certainly their best!) player.

We had our first very favourable experience of playing with pink balls v the CMBCF XI on tour from Queensland but with a couple of ex First graders and Shield players they were too strong for our elderly side. Next we turned out a stronger if not younger side at the SCG v the XXIX Club and suffered an extraordinary collapse from 2-152 to 9-163 with 4 consecutive ducks; while we tried hard to recover, once again a 10<sup>th</sup> wicket partnership by the XXIXers won them the game.

After Christmas our traditional game v Lindfield in their cricket week resulted in a tie after the Lindfield 10<sup>th</sup> wicket pair had put on 59 runs to level the scores. Then our first win of the season v Croydon where Kel Morrison showed his considerable batting talents, followed by a harbour sailing cruise the next day with Kel as skipper. A loss this year against the Bradman Foundation XI which had a strong bowling attack on an unpredictable wicket; and finally after 3 years and about 8 rain offs we played the Army at Victoria Barracks and had a close win.

Then followed possibly our most embarrassing moment of the season when nearly all our playing membership over 40 chose not to make themselves available to play at the superb Allan Border Oval in Queensland v a strong QCC side containing several ex-Shield players. It is intensely frustrating when year after year very few of those keen to accept the honour of playing at the SCG one year, seem to feel any sense of obligation to the fixture or the Club the next season when we play away. With several last minute fill-ins to make up numbers we lost heavily, predictably and quickly to leave a very frustrated captain in Mick McCormick in the changing rooms after the game. Procedures may change next season.

The season ended in a blaze of exciting games as firstly we defeated Hong Kong Australia on a difficult wicket in a low scoring game, then defeated the Sydney Cricket Club, with some strong guest players, another exciting tie v the UAE, and an extraordinary win v the Lords Taverners where somehow we cobbled together a third side on the day as we also happened to have all our best players in the Jack Pace Final that day and our Classics side playing.

The Canberra weekend seemed fated; for once Ed Smith had a strong side, only for the game to be moved from Canberra Grammar to an artificial wicket; then for the game to be cancelled 2 days out on the fear of predicted bad weather only for Canberra to put on a superb autumn day. Then yet another tie as Ian Neil tried to be the first to beat I Zingari (Australia) at Camden since 2005. The season ended with a late rearranged game in May at Mudgee where late cancellations led to a weak side and a bad loss but nevertheless a great social weekend.

Looking at the figures we appear to be attracting a large number of guest players, some quite young by our standards but regrettably few choose to take out membership and play regularly. The standard can vary and allows some of our veteran players to mix with younger and better players. At its best the standard is good and competitive, and generally is enjoyable and a good way of mingling players throughout the Club.

The combined effect of both Masters and Classics sides playing almost every Sunday does diminish the selection pool for social games, especially those games played on the same Sunday and we may be looking at more midweek fixtures next season.
