HISTORY OF THE CRICKETERS' CLUB of NSW

(Based on an article by award-winning cricket writer Jack Pollard)

The idea of forming a club for Sydney cricketers was first raised in 1894 when it was suggested that the New South Wales Cricket Association combine with the controlling bodies in cycling, swimming, rugby and athletics to form a sports club. Nothing came of the notion but in 1896 the NSWCA set up a sub-committee to inquire into the possibility of acquiring clubrooms for the Association. This committee's recommendation that the Association make an arrangement with the Commercial Travellers' Club in Pitt Street to use their premises was rejected.

The Cricketers' Club idea lapsed until 1927 when it was again discussed at a NSWCA meeting, but it was not until 1936 that the Association decided to build a club in its new building in George Street.

The prominent solicitor Sydney Webb, who had handled the purchase of the six-storey building in George Street for £54,803, drafted a constitution for the Cricketers' Club in August 1938, and the club was registered as a company on 14 November 1939, two months after the outbreak of World War II, and opened for business on 1 July 1940.

From the start the Cricketers' Club membership strongly supported the development of cricket. Two cricket nets were set up on the roof of Cricket House for members to practice during lunch hours and these nets remained in operation until 1953. Discussions among his fellow members made the Randwick batsman Jack Chegwyn aware of big possibilities for country tours by teams of leading players from the State's representative sides. Chegwyn, who scored 375 runs at an average of 46.87 with one century in his five matches for NSW between 1940 and 1942, became a sporting legend for the pioneering work he did in the bush with teams selected at the Cricketers' Club.

By 1942 the Cricketers' Club had made such dramatic progress that most Sydney grade cricketers were members and at the end of that year the Club made a one-thousand-pound loan to the NSWCA to help the Association continue operating at a time when it had no income from Test or Sheffield Shield cricket.

Annual games at the SCG v the NSWCA commenced in 1965. In 1971, seven club members were in Don Bradman's nomination for the best eleven Australian cricketers of the past 50 years. The Cricketers' Club entered a side in the City & Suburban competition in 1971 and has continued to play regularly in that competition.

Over the years many Test players have appeared for the Club, including Richie Benaud, Trevor Chappell, Richard Collinge (New Zealand), Alan Davidson, Nilakshi de Silva (Sri Lanka), Phil Emery, Dave Gilbert, Alex Hales (England), Greg Matthews, Keith Miller, Arthur Morris, Geoff Lawson, 'Mani' Subramanya (India), Allan Turner, Bill Watson, and Mike Whitney.

Under the presidency of Ron Holmes, the Club introduced a rule automatically granting membership to Australian Test players. The England and Australian teams in the 1988 Bicentenary match in Sydney played for a trophy donated by the Cricketers' Club.

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In 1981 the Club moved to Barracks Street where it remained until the liquidation of the old Club in 2001.

Cricketers' Club teams have been a dominating force in the Sydney City and Suburban competition for nearly fifty years. The Club has hosted numerous touring teams from countries such as England, Canada, Malaysia, India, the West Indies, New Zealand and the USA. Overseas tours have become common.

With the liquidation of the registered club and the loss of its Barrack Street premises in 2001, the cricket and golf players retained the name and logo and continued to play, as a new incorporated association, still called "The Cricketers' Club of New South Wales", which was registered on 14 July 2003.

Editor's note: Jack Pollard (1926-2002) was the author of over eighty sports related books, and numerous outstanding cricket books including an authoritative five-volume history of Australian cricket. He also wrote the most popular of all Australian cricket encyclopaedias, entitled "The Game and The Players".

"True to the Blue"

New South Wales - Why the name?

Originally part of "New Holland", It became known as "New South Wales" in 1770 after Cook's exploration of the East Coast of what is now called "Australia". Whether Cook personally at the time called it New South Wales, and if so, why, is still a subject of doubt and scholarly speculation. Possibly Cook originally called it "New Wales", by analogy with the islands of "New Britain", which had originally been part of New Guinea. What is certain is that the name emerged later after he had dispatched his Journal to the Admiralty. Why "Wales" and why "South Wales" will probably never be known.

Royal Blue – Why the colour?

When intercolonial cricket commenced in the 1850s, the Victorians wore dark blue trousers and white shirts. NSW wore white trousers and light blue shirts. They became known as the "Light Blues". In 1904-5, the colour changed to Royal Blue. The colour remains Royal Blue and the NSW team still remains known by its traditional name as "the Blues"

Comparison to "the Green and Gold"

"The Blues" can trace their origin approximately 40 years before the adoption of the traditional Australian "Green and Gold", which were not adopted as national colours till the Australian tour to England in 1899 nor for home Tests until after Federation in 1902. Prior to that time, it had been customary in home Tests to wear the colours of the State in which the match was played-i.e.-dark blue in Victoria and light blue in NSW.

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The first Australian touring team to England in 1878 wore black and white; the 1880 team –faded magenta and black; the 1882 team wore the colours of the 96th regiment-red, black and yellow. That then changed to the red, white and blue of the Melbourne Cricket Club, although once, the light blue caps of the East Melbourne Club were used. By 1890, the team had adopted dark blue blazers and caps, with gold trim with, for the first time, the Australian Coat of Arms. It was the 1899 team to England that first adopted the Green and Gold, but it was not until 1902 at the MCG that the Green and Gold were worn in a home Test. Thus the Royal Blue colours adopted by The Cricketers' Club of New South Wales arguably have an older provenance, dating back to the 1850s, than the national colours which only date to the turn of the century.

The Emblem - Why the Cross of St George in New South Wales?

The emblem is taken from the Coat of Arms of the Colony, originally designed in 1875-6, and subsequently formally granted by King Edward VII in 1906 and described as: *"Azure a cross argent voided gules charged in the centre chief point with a lion passant guardant, and on each member with a mullet of eight points or between in the first and fourth quarters a fleece or banded argent and in the second and third quarters a garb."*

The gold crossed bats need no explanation. The cross of St George is English as is the lion, and not Welsh. The design comes from the British Royal Navy White Ensign, with whom its co-designer Captain Hixson, President of the Marine Board was closely connected.

The connection is with England or perhaps Britain as the home country, not with Wales. It remains the official Coat of Arms of New South Wales.

CURRENT TEAMS & COMPETITIONS

CCNSW currently has approximately 100 active cricketers. The Club also has a golf section. Of those 100 cricketers, approximately thirty play for the Club on Saturdays, and another seventy on Sundays and in mid-week games.

In the City and Suburban competition on Saturday and some Sunday afternoons, the Club arranges about sixteen fixtures a season. These are usually thirty-five overs a side, although by agreement, they are sometimes extended to forty overs. The C&S "competition" does not have a formal league table and not all clubs in the competition play each other. Nevertheless cricket is played in a competitive manner, and at its best, would probably equate to the standard of Sydney 3rd-4th Grade Cricket, although considerably shortened. In recent seasons, the Club has lost few C&S games. In addition there is a two part Jack Pace Cup competition; part one is a league structure for points before Christmas; part two is where the top eight teams go into a knock out stage after New Year; CCNSW has won the Cup four times. The club has just celebrated its 50th season in the C&S and has never lost more games in a season than it has won.

On Sundays, the Club plays eleven fixtures in a competitive over 40s "Masters" league, in which the Club's position has varied from league winners to bottom. These are forty overs per side games. Six bowlers must be used, and batsmen must retire on scoring four runs. The Club also plays an eleven round

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over 50s "Classics" competition with similar rules and in 2016 won the Premiership. A Vintages over 60s competition commenced in 2017 with similar rules.

Outside leagues, the Club generally also plays about ten other competitive but "friendly" fixtures each year, on grounds which have varied from major national grounds such as the MCG, SCG, the Gabba, Telstra (Olympic) Stadium and Bradman Oval, Bowral, to small country grounds such as Mandalong, and Mudgee. Opposition includes teams such as the Bradman Foundation, the Melbourne Cricket Club, Molonglo (Canberra), the Primary Club, the Queensland Cricketers' Club, the Sydney Cricket Club, and usually one or two overseas touring sides. These are generally full day games of about 45-50 overs a side.

In February 2004, the Club was invited by the SCG Trust and Cricket NSW to represent the Civilian population of the State in a match against the Military to celebrate 150 years of cricket at the SCG. A special plaque to commemorate this is permanently displayed on the exterior wall of the home dressing room at the SCG and the ball used in the match is on display in the Museum.

Since 2018 the Club has also entered a side in a summer midweek evening T20 eight-a-side competition run by "The Last Man Stands" with fourteen evening rounds on artificial wickets in Moore Park and plays a similar winter Sunday morning competition.

In the 2021-2022 season, despite rain and Covid, the Club played a total of forty-eight games comprising: thirty-four eleven-a-side fixtures, ten summer LMS and four winter LMS eight-a-side T20s and used nearly ninety players.

Established In 1957, Waratah Cricket Club is a founding club of the Darwin & District Cricket Competition and has a long and proud history. The Club is the most successful in the competition, having won fifteen Men's Premier Grade Premierships, six more than their closest rival.

In 2021, the Club fielded fifteen teams in the Men's, Women's and Junior competitions. Their Premier Grade Men competed in the T20, One-Day and Two-Day Grand Finals, winning the one-day Premiership, with the Women's team winning back-to-back titles.

Their home ground is Darwin's most picturesque ground Gardens Oval in the Darwin suburb of The Gardens. Located across the road from Mindil Beach Casino, Mindil Beach Markets and close to Darwin City and the suburbs of Fannie Bay and Parap, Gardens Oval is one of only two Darwin grounds to have hosted international cricket.

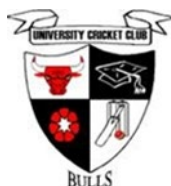
The Darwin Cricket Club, known as the Eagles, is an amateur to semi-professional cricket club based in Darwin, NT. Located at the picturesque Kahlin Oval in the inner-city suburb of Larrakeyah which is a five-minute walk from the CBD.

The Club has a strong history and fine tradition of producing premier cricketers to the Darwin & District Cricket Competition and NT Representative duties while also attracting first class players to the Club during the winter.

They cater for all levels of cricket, from beginners with Woolworths Blast Cricket held on a Friday evenings, juniors teams from U11's through to U17's and senior men's teams in all five grades. Premier grade to C grade is played on Saturday, and D & E grade play on Sundays.

The Eagles are also strong socially, with at least three functions held during the regular season, a favourite being the annual Quiz Night held in front of the Pavilion, and the ever so popular Cocktail night.

This season they are fielding B, 2 x C, 2 x D and 2 x E grade teams, the most teams they have had in their history. Their current demographic is Nepalese, Indian, Pakistani, and Bangladeshi (they are pretty sure they have no Caucasian this year). Players are a mix of students and employed. They have attracted more students over the years and have the lowest fees in Darwin. They get funding through the University Student Association, sponsors and grants. The club started back in 1989 under a different name and was not until 2000 that University was added to their name after they relocated to the university grounds.

There are two small grandstands and good shade coverage from a grove of mango trees and usually an afternoon breeze. Sometimes they get sandflies, depending on the tides, as the oval is next to a creek surrounded by mangroves. Most of the time it is extremely pleasant, and teams enjoy playing at their ground.

ROBERT BEVILACQUA *Aged 60* *Mitsubishi Service & Parts Manager*

Right-arm opening batter and off spin bowler and a specialist gully fieldsman. Played for the Port Melbourne Cricket Club in the Victorian Sub District during the 1980s-90s and was involved in three Senior Premierships. Played the next ten years for Doutta Stars Senior Division in the Victorian Turf Cricket Association; involved in four Premierships. Returned to the Port Melbourne CC and now currently playing in the lower grades in the one-day competitions. Eighth overseas cricket trip with CCNSW after Italy in 2010, South America in 2012, England in 2013 and 2017, SE Asia in 2014, North America in 2015 Nelson New Zealand in 2016 and Sri Lanka in 2019. BILL BLAIR *Aged 59* *Delivery Driver*

Highly talented right-arm fast bowler and fluent middle order batter. Was part of the Australian over 50s World Cup winning team in 2018. Right-handed top order batter, and if called upon can bowl right arm medium rubbish deliveries somewhat proficiently. Only started playing Park Cricket fifteen years ago, has won three B Grade premierships with Balmain Tigers CC and was Club Captain of the Tigers for four years. In the past eight years, he has played for CCNSW in the Masters, Classics and occasionally for the C&S sides. Has also recently enjoyed playing Representative Cricket for Port Jackson over 50s and Veterans Cricket NSW over 50s. He currently plays for CCNSW in the over 50s Classics team. This will be his second tour with CCNSW after Nelson New Zealand in 2017 Coming with his wife Lesley, and their friend Peta Zullo.

Left-arm medium fast bowler and right-hand batting allrounder (all said on an age relative basis). Grew up playing cricket in country QLD, Nudgee College Brisbane in high school and then grade for QUT before coming to Sydney in the pre-Olympic boom. In 2017, after a twenty-year hiatus and a dare from his daughters, started playing again and now doesn't miss many opportunities to take to the field. Case in point, this being his first opportunity and tour for CCNSW. Looking forward to another opportunity to build long-term friendships and memories on tour.

TOM ROBERTSON *Aged 50* *Computer Programmer*

Aggressive and hard hitting left-hand opening bat and occasional right-hand medium-fast bowler who often likes to bowl round the wicket. Tom used to play for his local side Peakhurst in a hard wicket competition where his skills made him a formidable player. He has played regularly for the CCNSW C&S side since 2009. Toured with CCNSW since a teenager to New Zealand in 1993, Malaysia in 1994 and Lord Howe in 1998 with his father Rodger who was a very accomplished first grader, and also to Samoa in 2006, England (twice) in 2013 and 2017, North America in 2015, Sri Lanka 2019, Perth 2020 and New Zealand 6 times - Christchurch in 1993 and 2018. Wellington 2015, Queenstown 2016, Nelson 2017 and Auckland in 2019 and Perth in 2020. This will be his fifteenth tour with CCNSW.

JOE SCARCELLA *Aged 64* *Retired Solicitor*

Right-hand medium pace bowler and late order batter. Played lower grades with Waverley and Uni of NSW in his youth. After several years away from the game, Joe rediscovered his love of cricket and played Masters with Lane Cove for a few seasons. In more recent years, he has played C&S with CCNSW and the Primary Club of Australia (PCA), Classics and Veterans Cricket with Port Jackson and for VCNSW. Has been involved with the PCA for many years as both a player and committee member, having also toured with PCA to the UK in 2007, Kenya in 2018 and again to the UK in 2019. A perennial cricket tourist, this will be Joe's seventh tour with CCNSW after New Zealand in 2007, England (twice) in 2009 and 2017, Italy in 2010, South America in 2012, New Zealand in 2016 and Perth in 2020.

MARTIN SPIESER *Aged 57* *Financial Planner*

Left-arm orthodox bowler and middle order batter currently playing in the CCNSW Classics over 50s team. Played Grade with Uni NSW between ages 18-22, predominantly as an opening batsman. Joined CCNSW two years ago following many years coaching his son who is now playing Grade allowing Martin to concentrate on playing again. This will be his first tour with CCNSW.

DAVE STEWART *Aged 63* *Electrician*

Right-hand off spinner and right-hand bat. Formerly played First Grade and representative cricket in Mackay and for Queensland Country. Now plays for Pioneer Valley in Mackay, Northern Queensland. This will be his tenth tour with CCNSW after Malaysia, West Indies, South Africa, England, Italy, South America, SE Asia, North America and Sri Lanka. Coming with his partner Desley Ferguson.

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MIKE WEAVER *Aged 56* *Cruise Consultant, Princess Cruises - Carnival Australia Group*

Right-hand bat and occasional wicket keeper. Occasional right-arm off spinner. Having enjoyed eight seasons with CCNSW this is 'Weaves' third tour with CCNSW, after New Zealand (Nelson) and the UK both in 2017. He is a top order bat who has played lower grade premier cricket in Sydney for Hawkesbury, Manly, Randwick and Gordon, as well as a three-year stint in Perth, WA. In the 2004-5 WACA season, playing for Mt. Lawley DCC, he experienced 4th grade grand final success. Mike has also played lower league cricket for Blackheath, Surrey UK in 2001 and 2002. Having rekindled his music career and mindful of his fingers, Jed is focusing on umpiring, winning the Sydney Shires Rookie Umpire of the Year, and also umpires Australian Rules Football. This will be Jed's second tour with CCNSW after Perth in 2020.

MICHAEL WHITTALL *Aged 20* *Looking for work Landscaping or Joinery*

Left-hand bat. Right-arm opening bowler for Campbelltown Camden District 4th Grade. Started Grade 2021/22 in 5th grade before moving to 4th Grade. Spent fourteen months with a joinery company before Covid and now doing some lawn mowing and landscape work casually. Played most of Junior cricket with Bradbury CC before playing seniors their progressing through grades to as high 2nd grade at eighteen. This will be his first tour with CCNSW.

Right-hand Bat and medium-pace bowler. Love fielding, chasing and saving runs. Played local cricket with Bradbury CC for nineteen years. First year playing grade 2021/22 age 51. Currently captain Campbelltown Camden District 5th Grade to pass on love of cricket to the emerging players entering the club. Play Masters and Classics with Georges River. First Rep cricket was at Orange State carnival for Port Jackson. Played again the following year again then at Central Coast. Went to Perth and played in the winning Division 2 NSW team at Nationals. Coming with his son, Michael. This will be his first tour with CCNSW.

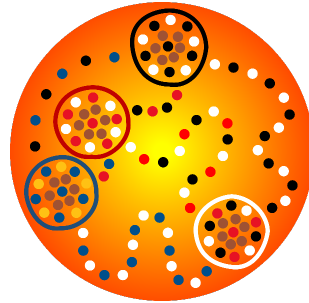
JOHN WISE *Aged 60* *Owner/ General Manager – Wise Cleaning Group Melbourne*

DARWIN TOUR LOGO



CCNSW acknowledges and pays respect to the past, present and future Traditional Custodians and Elders of this nation and the continuation of cultural, spiritual and educational practices of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

The inspiration for the Darwin Tour Logo came from the creativity and storytelling traditions through artwork from the Indigenous peoples of Australia. The design was conceptualised by Mike Pinter and was developed in conjunction with Bpromo, a Queensland based arthouse that have been collaborating with Indigenous artists and the customers of Bpromo for over twenty years. This logo represents several aspects of this journey for the CCNSW Touring Party as it is the first tour to Darwin for our club.

There are four inner rings, each ring represents one of the clubs that we will be playing against or at on this tour. Each ring (when overlaid on a map of Darwin) also roughly geographically represents the location of each club relative to each other. Within each ring there are seventeen dots, the ten dots immediately in inside each ring and the dot at the centre represent the playing eleven from each club, with their Captain being the dot in the centre. The eleven dots also alternate in the club colours of each home ground. The remaining six ochre dots inside each ring then represent the earth and represents a sign of our respect for the Traditional Custodians of the lands that we will be playing on.

Each ring is then linked to all other rings through a series of dots or pathways to represent both our connection to each club we will be playing against and the existing connections that each club already has with each of the other clubs. The colour of each dot emanating from the outer side of each ring is the colour of the ring of its destination and the dots alternate in colour between the origin and destination. Each dot on each pathway also represents a scale of approximately two kilometres, which provides a guide as to the distance between each of the clubs.

The background yellow and orange circle represents the harsh climate and radiating heat of Darwin and is also intended to symbolise the energy that all members of the CCNSW touring party will be giving to and receiving from the local community on this our first tour to Darwin. This logo will be proudly displayed by CCNSW on the Off Field Polo & Shorts, our Playing Shirt and Playing Caps for this tour.
